



MEETING NOTES

A hearty THANK YOU to Dr. Gene Varney of Cook College, Rutgers, who told us about mycorrhiza at our March meeting. It is possible that 90% of vascular plants have mycorrhizal relationships. Radioactive labeled compounds have been used to trace the transport of materials from the root to the fungus. Of concern to forestry is the fact that in soil of low nutrients, seedlings of trees and some vegetables have shown increased dry weight when mycorrhiza are present. Many other facts were discussed. Those members present thoroughly enjoyed the lecture, slides and examination of fresh specimens of mycorrhiza from Dr. Varney's white pine tree.

The library has received some items through the time and effort of Robert Peabody. All the newsletters of mycological clubs that correspond with NJMA and all of NJMA's past newsletters have been photostatted and our now in the library for your examination. Our librarian, Hiram Korn, has sent me a list of the eight books the library contains. Three of these are wild plant books. Any donations will be greatfully accepted. 
