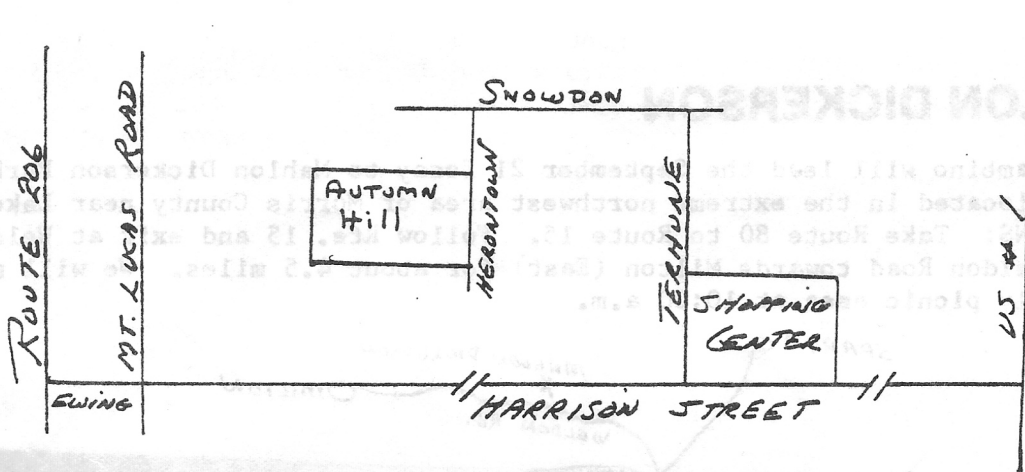

## AUTUMN HILL

Autumn Hill Park is scheduled for our September 7th foray. The park is located north of the town of Princeton. Neal MacDonald will lead the 10:00 a.m. foray. DIRECTIONS: From Route 206 South, make a left turn at Ewing Street, just before town. Ewing Street becomes Harrison. Go past Mt. Lucas Road and make a left turn just before the Princeton shopping center onto Terhune. At the end of Terhune, make a left turn onto Snowdon and go past the Herontown woods. At Herontown Road, make a left. The parking lot is about three blocks up on the right.

From Route 1: Take the Harrison Street exit above Princeton. Continue on Harrison (over a two-lane bridge) to Nassau & Kingston Street light. Keep on Harrison past the shopping center on the right. The first right past the shopping center is Terhune. Make a right onto Terhune and continue as directions above.

Be on time for the foray. Depending on rainfall prior to the foray, we may car-pool to another nearby site.

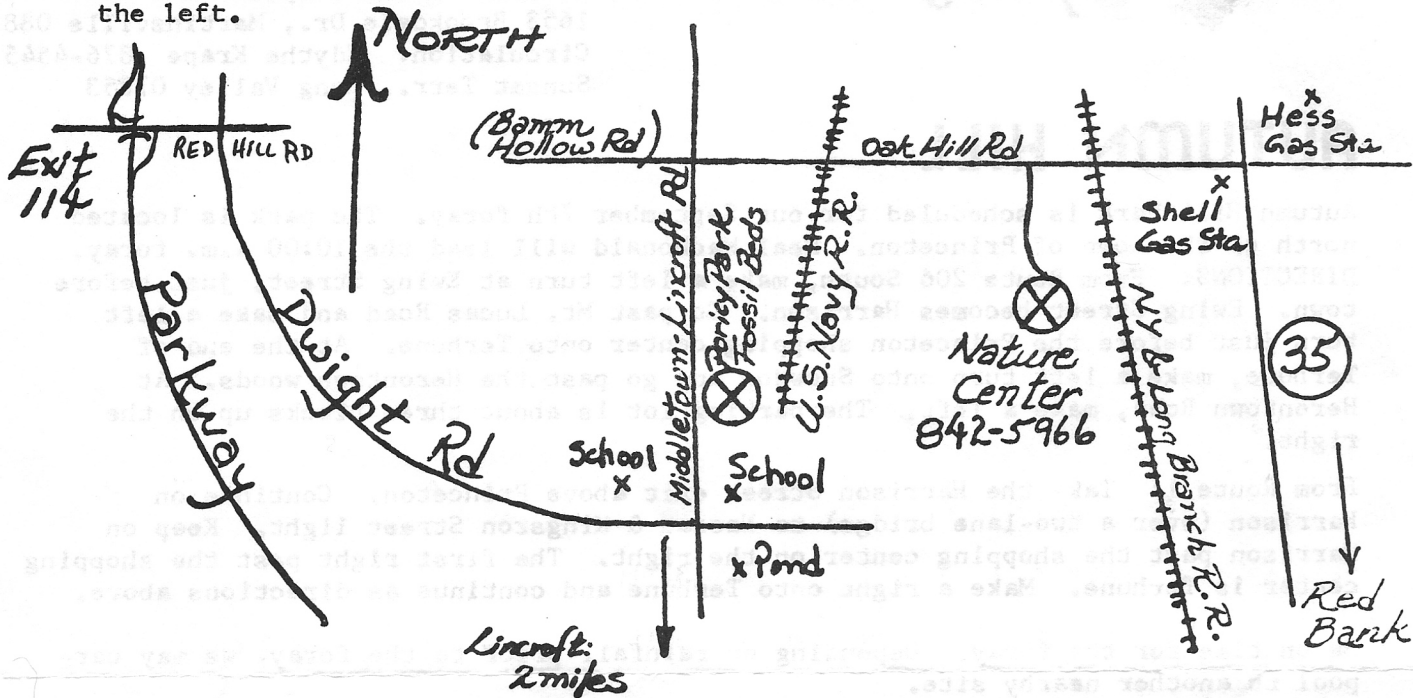


## PORICY PARK

The September 14th foray will be held at Poricy Park Nature Center. at 10:00 a.m. The nature center is located on Oak Hill Road, Middletown, N.J., just west of Route 35. Directions on page 2. Leader: Pat Contreras.

DIRECTIONS: From the Garden State Parkway, exit at Exit 114 (Holmdel-Middletown). Coming from the north, make a left turn onto Red Hill Road. Coming from the south, make a right. Take the first right turn which is Dwight Road, and stay on this road 1½ miles to first stop sign. At stop sign, turn left onto Middletown-Lincroft Road. Continue for ¼ mile, then turn right onto Oak Hill Road. Immediately before the second set of railroad tracks is the nature center on the right.

From Route 35, take Oak Hill Road west approximately one mile north of Red Bank. Directly after the first set of railroad tracks will be the Nature Center on the left.



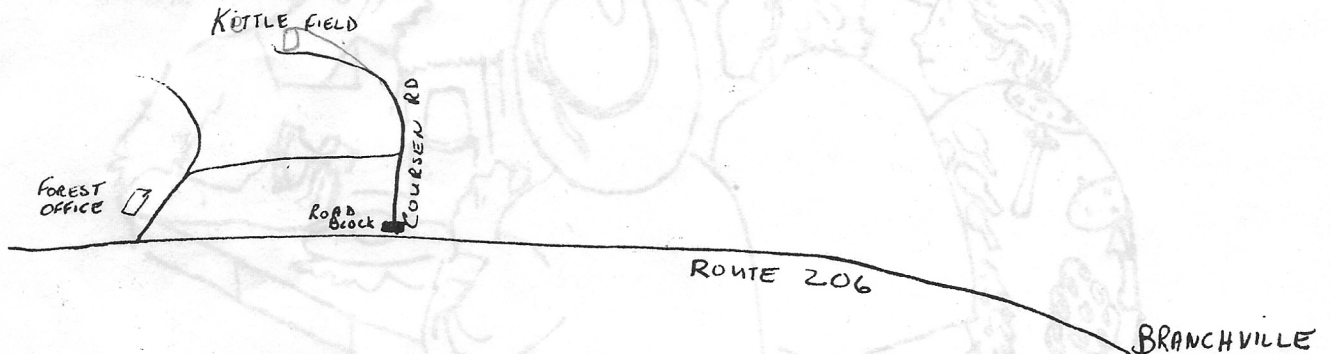
## MAHLON DICKERSON

Members are cordially invited to exhibit their mushroom drawings, prints, photographs, x-ray scanning electron micrographs, note book and field sketches - in October at SCEEC, during which time our Fungus Fest will take place. Lightly matted work is best, as we must use velcro for hanging. Framed work can be accommodated. We may not use conventional picture hangers. The partition-like velcro-covered sections are free-standing - something like your uncle. You could hang a picture on him with wires over his shoulder and secured to his heels discretely behind him. But you couldn't nail anything into his chest. Same problem. Also welcome: Charts and diagrams.

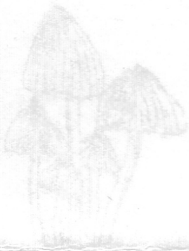
FUNGUS FEST
